Dear President Obama:

We are at a momentous time in the fight to end the global AIDS epidemic. Now more than ever, we need your leadership for a renewed global effort to end the worst epidemic of our time.

In recent months, dramatic scientific breakthroughs and new approaches for reversing the epidemic, call for an emphasis on expanding access to HIV treatment, and supporting high quality, appropriate and effective, prevention and care initiatives that are critical to contain and eventually defeat HIV/AIDS. With this tremendous momentum on our side, I urge you to announce a new effort to end AIDS, this World AIDS Day, considering the following initiatives:

- Direct the Secretary of State, in coordination with the Office of U.S. Global AIDS Coordinator, to announce a new goal of treating 6 million people by 2013 through PEPFAR;
- Direct the Secretary of Health and Human Services, in coordination with the Director of
 the Office of National AIDS Policy, to announce a new initiative to expand HIV
 prevention, care and treatment activities in U.S. jurisdictions with rising HIV incidence
 and growing AIDS Drug Assistance Programs waiting lists, in advance of Affordable
 Care Act provisions starting in 2014; and
- Direct the Attorney General, Secretary of Health and Human Services, and the Secretary of Defense to review federal and state laws, policies, regulations, and judicial proceedings that involve criminal cases against people living with HIV/AIDS.

Domestically, the first-ever National HIV/AIDS Strategy provides a comprehensive, outcomesoriented roadmap for reducing HIV infections, increasing access to care, and addressing health disparities. In addition, implementing the Affordable Care Act will expand critically needed HIV care, treatment and prevention services for many communities in our country.
