<u>Weeks v. State</u>, 834 S.W.2d 559, 562-65 (Tx.Ct.App.1992) (sustaining attempted murder conviction of HIV-infected inmate who spat into face of guard)

<u>Commonwealth v. Brown</u>, 413 Pa.Super. 421, 605 A.2d 429 430-31 (1992) (sustaining aggravated assault conviction against inmate with HIV and hepatitis who flung fecal material into guard's mouth).

<u>Smallwood v. State of Maryland</u> 343 Md. 97, 680 A.2d 512 (Md. 1996) (no specific intent to kill) <u>State v Hinkhouse</u>, 912 P. 2d 921, <u>mod.</u> 915 P.2d 489 (Or. Ct. App. 1996)

<u>State v. Bird</u>, 81 Ohio St.3d 582, 692 N.E.2d 1013, 1016 (1998) (affirming no contest plea of HIV-infected defendant who spat in police officer's face because plea made it unnecessary to decide whether HIV could be transmitted by saliva).
